
1. Receiving the bread and drinking from the chalice, or

From the Pastor

Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Alleluia! Christ is risen! In the Disney retelling of the classic fairy tale, The Princess and the Frog, Tiana and Prince Naveen, are both looking for happiness, love, beauty, and purpose in life. Only through the trials and adventures of living life as frogs, do they realize they have been looking in all the wrong places. Prince Naveen has been seeking fulfillment by running from his responsibilities and family. He seeks meaning and purpose in the frivolous use of beauty, pleasure and money. Tiana is seeking her purpose and meaning through a misguided perception of the past, family and hard work. As a result, both are frustrated and confused by life. It is only when they both learn to see what is in front of them in the present moment and to see the past, hard work, family, and beauty as gifts to be treasured, appreciated, learned from, protected and shared as appropriate, that Tiana and Naveen realize that love, beauty and meaning have been with them all through their journey.

So it is with the life of faith. So often we are taught the faith as though faith is always pointing to some future life, some life that will, be but is not yet. And so, we live life in that way always expecting some future reward or fulfillment. As a result, we often miss the opportunities to enjoy the life we live each day. Even the Resurrection is not simply some past historical event, pious legend told as part of our Christian story or a hope for a future occurrence. Christ, his compassion, his mercy, his teaching and moral guidance are meant to be resurrected, alive, in us in the here and now. The Lord is risen indeed! Alleluia!
