
1. Receiving the bread and drinking from the chalice, or

Brothers and Sisters,

Alleluia! Christ is risen! So many people help to make the liturgy and
worship experience of the church meaningful and a time of dignity and
beauty.

This Easter was a great celebration of the Resurrection. As always, the
church was decorated beautifully. Attendance was 126. And, I even had the
opportunity to use some incense, be still my Catholic heart! (Haha)

However, what really made the day stand out for me was the reception after
the celebration of the Lord's Supper. Several of our families welcomed us to
Galilee by treating us to a Nigerian feast! After the Resurrection, Jesus, told
Mary to that he was going ahead of the Disciples to Galilee and they should
meet him there. And when they did finally meet, what did Jesus do? He
treated them to a cookout on the sea shore. The members of our parish family
from Nigeria brought us into a tradition from home...and brought us to
